

HOW DO WE GET SUCH GREAT SPEAKERS?

The Program Committee begins planning for the Distinguished Speakers Series a year in advance. For example, planning for the upcoming 2023-2024 session started in September 2022. Program planning typically kicks off with a brainstorming session to identify potential areas of focus, such as high impact global issues and trends, prominent thought leaders in international affairs, countries or regions that haven't been covered in a while or that are of emerging importance. Each Committee member takes a topic, thought leader and/or country/region to further research. As prospective speakers are identified, their biographical information and videos of past presentations are shared with the whole Committee for vetting and to prioritize recruitment efforts. Assigned Committee members then start the often arduous process of trying to contact prospective speakers, which may involve reaching out to numerous sources who may be able to facilitate an introduction. Once contact is established, an invitation is extended, and if accepted, a date is agreed upon.

Given the profile of the speakers targeted, a Committee member may devote several weeks recruiting a speaker only to experience an unsuccessful outcome. In fact in some years, the Program Committee may reach out to as many as 30 or 40 prospective speakers before locking in confirmations for all speaker slots. WACHH is fortunate to have such a dedicated Committee that perseveres year after year to bring in engaging speakers and keep our members informed of world affairs.
